

INTRODUCTION

Hinsdale School District has long recognized and embraced the shift from the traditional instruction-centered approach in its public schools to the learner-centered journey resulting in agency for all, so it is only fitting that our definition of agency has been developed by our students:

Learner agency is defined as "having the courage and the selflessness to co-create a better school community".

To set the conditions for this learning framework, the school district is redesigning its pedagogical approach to recognize and build upon each student's unique strengths, interests, and learning styles. As a result, educators are varying forms of assessment and increasing reliance on student reflections to identify individual assets and tailor instruction accordingly. While the primary architecture of the revised platform is differentiated instruction, there is a much heavier reliance on relationship building with an emphasis on personalized student learning plans and career aspirations. Collaboration among all of the community stakeholders is critical in order to appropriately and successfully support personalized learning pathways that foster growth in our core values and Portrait of a Learner skills and dispositions.

Lastly, the school district is innovating its approach to funding its public schools through a tailored business model that actively and overtly seeks opportunities to generate revenue while also driving cost efficiency in its operations. It is no secret that funding public schools has become an expensive burden on property owners in New Hampshire, and there does not appear to be a plausible state level solution at the time of this publication. Therefore, the school district has made affordability one of its four priority areas with the goal of shrinking the amount of tax dollars needed by generating more revenue while keeping expenses in line with the goals of this plan.

Overall, this strategic plan only represents the beginning of a long transformational process in the Hinsdale School District. It has been developed with sustainability in mind, while also requiring some immediate course corrections on areas such as student achievement and communications. All of this work and hope brings to mind a familiar Chinese proverb, "The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The second best time is now."

DISTRICT DEMOGRAPHICS

Hinsdale School District is a public PK-12 school district serving 520 students through an innovative and contemporary array of instructional service programs. Hinsdale boasts a strong community approach to education and works in partnership with the Town of Hinsdale to help prepare all of its students for their post-secondary experiences including college, employment, military, or tradeschool.

On average, the student-to-teacher ratio is 11:1 within a range of rigorous and challenging learning experiences. Close to 50% of the students in Hinsdale qualify for free or reduced meals, where the median household income is just over \$68,000 and the median price of a home is \$181,800. The composition of the student body is predominantly white at 86.6%, with 0.8% Black, 2.8% Hispanic, 1.5% Asian, and 8.5% identified as two or more races. Approximately 59% of the students identify as male and 41% as female, and of the members of the Class of 2025, 44% went to a two or four year college, 6% are entering trade school, and 50% are entering full-time employment.

There are two school buildings and one central office building on an approximately 19 acre campus housing the superintendent, business, human resource, and students services offices. While there are 5 FTEs working in the central office, the superintendent (0.6 FTE) and the human resources/business office assistant (0.4 FTE) are part-time. Working across the campus in their respective school buildings, there are sixty certified teachers, two school principals, one assistant principal, and seventy administrative and operations support staff ranging from paraprofessionals, coordinators, custodians, facilities maintenance technicians, groundskeepers, assistants, and specialists.

PRIORITY AREA Teaching and Learning

We will personalize learning using a strengths-based instructional approach with all students.

Our Plan

Differentiated Instruction - We will implement differentiated instructional practices in all grade levels, PK-12. Phase One will be implemented by the end of the 2028 academic year, and Phase Two will be implemented by the end of the 2030 academic year.

Members of the Hinsdale school community will empower all students with agency in their learning.

Our Plan

Learner Agency - By the end of the 2030 academic year, students will have developed a sense of ownership for their learning and worked in partnership with the educators chiefly responsible for ensuring it.

Hinsdale Middle High School will establish post-graduation pathway plans for all secondary school students.

Our Plan

Future Learning Pathways - We will bring to life our "Portrait of a Learner" and customize students' pathways to ensure they are prepared for college, career, and life, using a combination of resources, coaching, and data-driven insights to foster success habits and open future opportunities.

Hinsdale Middle High School will continue to redesign the middle school experience so that it can shift to a student-centered and community-based learning model.

Our Plan

Middle School Redesign - We will continue to build stakeholder support, agency for students, integrate learning experiences that incorporate community mindedness, and amplify student voices.

PRIORITY AREA Teaching and Learning



Hinsdale Elementary School will strengthen students' literacy and numeracy skills at the elementary level through implementation of differentiated instruction and integrity of district curriculum at Tier 1.

Our Plan

Fundamentals of Literacy and Numeracy – We will identify specific student needs, set goals, and develop a logical sequence of learning activities focused on core areas (such as phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension). We will emphasize building both conceptual understanding and the practical application of mathematical skills, and we will establish methods to monitor progress and adjust instruction for each student accordingly.

Hinsdale Elementary School will expand and strengthen the preschool program.

Our Plan

Expansion of Access and Programming — We will research and design a mixed-delivery system that removes barriers for families to access programs, ensures high-quality offerings, and secures robust, sustained funding to provide programming and support that best serve students' learning needs.

Identify and Address Factors for Absenteeism - We will foster a welcoming and engaging environment, use data to identify at-risk students, and implement a comprehensive strategy involving early and consistent communication with parents, positive reinforcement for good attendance, and collaboration with the community to address underlying barriers to attendance.

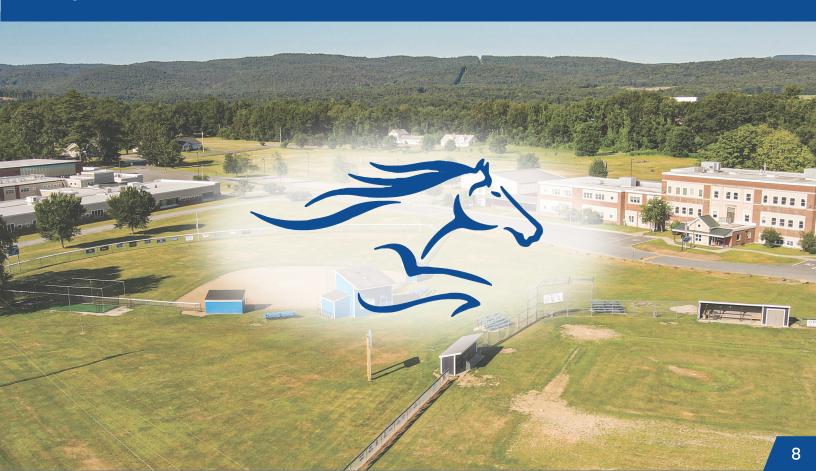

GLOSSARY OF EDUCATIONAL TERMS

Agency

Learner agency is defined as having the courage and the selflessness to co-create a better school community. This is accomplished when students take responsibility for their learning, play an integral role in determining how they will learn best, and collaborating with those who are responsible for generating their instructional experiences.

Character Development

Teaching students' values such as being flexible, connected, cooperative, and ready to learn. This leads to the areas of portrait of a learner: communication, character, critical thinking, collaboration, and essential life skills.

Differentiated Instruction

Adjusting lessons, so they meet the needs of all students — giving extra support to some, more challenge to others, and multiple ways to learn the same skill. This includes Universal Design for Learning (UDL).

ELA

English Language Arts includes writing and literacy.

ELOs (Extended Learning Opportunities)

Learning experiences outside the regular classroom, like internships, community projects, or independent studies, that count for school credit.

Pedagogical

Methods and principles used for teaching.

Personalized Learning Plan (PLP) / Post-Graduation Plan (PGP)

An individualized plan that outlines a student's strengths, interests, and goals for after high school (college, career, or other pathways).

SEL (Social and Emotional Learning)

Helping students learn to understand and manage their emotions, build positive relationships, and make responsible choices.

Tier 1, Tier 2, Tier 3 Supports

Levels of student support:

- Tier 1: Core instruction for all students.
- Tier 2: Extra small-group help for students who need more support.
- Tier 3: Intensive, individualized help for students with significant needs.

GLOSSARY OF EDUCATIONAL TERMS

Universal Design for Learning (UDL)

An educational approach that designs lessons so all students can access and engage with the learning, no matter their strengths or challenges. UDL gives students multiple ways to learn, show what they know, and stay motivated.

The three main areas of UDL are:

- 1. Engagement (the "Why" of learning): Giving students choices and supports that help them stay interested and motivated.
- 2. Representation (the "What" of learning): Presenting information in different ways such as text, visuals, audio, or hands-on activities so all learners can understand.
- 3. Action & Expression (the "How" of learning): Allowing students different ways to show what they know like writing, speaking, creating a project, or using technology.
